CROWLE is a parish and township, small market town, and station on the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, pleasantly situated in the isle of Axholme, partly in Yorkshire, in the Northern division of the county, west division of the wapentake of Manley, union and county court district of Thorne, parts of Lindsey, rural deanery of Ax-holme, archdeaconry of Stow, and diocese of Lincoln, near the Staniforth and Keadby canal, 6 miles north-west from Epworth, 12 south from Goole, 16 north-east from Doncaster, 17 north-by-west from Gainsborough and 165 from London. The town adopted the local government act in 1865; the Board consists of 9 members. The town is lighted with gas and paved. The church of St. Oswald is a building of stone the earliest portions being Early English, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave, north aisle, porch, and a tower containing 3 bells: historic evidences prove the early existence here of a church dedicated to St. Oswald, the christian King of Northumbria, slain 5th August, 642, although probably only a wooden structure: the shaft of a stone runic cross was used by the Norman masons as a lintel for the west-door, where it still remains, it tapers a little, and has on one side an interlaced ornament, and upon the other two rough figures, underneath being a man on horse-back: in 1868 the Rev. J. F. Fowler discovered upon this stone the remains of an inscription: the south wall, of ashlar in small cubes, remains, with the inner jamb of one of the narrow Norman windows: the south door is a rich one, of three orders, and some stones of another door with zigzag moulding were found used in the walling on the north side; the chancel, rebuilt about 1850, is said to be upon the old foundation, and inclines towards the north; the porch of brick and stone was added in 1628, and there is a carved oak almsbox dated 1683; the north pell stelled according to gustom on week days at 6 a more pell. is tolled according to custom on weekdays, at 6 a.m. at noon, and at 6 p.m: several attempts at restoration were made at certain periods; the recent restoration in 1876, which included the re-roofing of the church, re-seating the interior, and other works, was completed under the direction of Mr. A. S. Ellis, architect of Westminster. The register, including Eastoft, dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value, from 500 acres of glebe, £800, with residence, and in the gift of the present rector, and held since 1868 by the Rev. Frederick William White B.A. of Pembroke College, Cambridge, who is non-resident Rev. Charles Frederick Brotherton M.A. of Hatfield Hall, Durham, is curate in charge. The Catholic church, dedicated to the Blessed Sacrament and St. Norbert, was erected in 1872: the ecclesiastical establishment consists of the church, which is a fine brick edifice, in the Early English style, from the designs of Mr. A. M. Hadfield, architect of Shefield, and also of a Monastery of Præmonstratensians,

or White Canons, following the rule of their founder, St. Norbert; the style of the Monastery is in keeping with that of the church; attached is a school, the area covered by these buildings is about two acres. The Very Rev. Martin Geudens C.E.P. is superior. Here are Congregational, Wesleyan, Baptist and Primitive Methodist chapels. The cemetery, opened in 1862, covers about two acres of ground, and has two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. The Town Hall was erected in 1870 by a limited company, with a capital of £1,450, raised in £5 shares. Here is an Assembly room. The market for stock is held every Monday fortnight during the months of March, April and May: there are also three annual fairs for cattle, held on the last Monday in May, and on the 23rd of November; and a statute for the hiring of farm labourers and domestic servants is held on the 1xth of November. A weekly market is held every Friday. The principal land-owners are Earl Manvers, who is lord of the manor, Thomas Harsley Carnochan esq. S. C. Brunyee esq. T. C. Scholey esq. and the Rev. Frederick, William White B.A. The soil is warp and silt; subsoil, peat and sand. The chief crops are wheat cats flay beaus and fluke potators. is warp and sit; subsoil, peat and sand. The chief crops are wheat, oats, flax, beans and fluke potatoes. The area is 7,350 acres, inclusive of Eastoft; the population of the township in 1881 was 2,826, of which 28 were in Yorkshire; the population of the parish and Local Board district in 1881 was 3,353, which includes Eastoft, a township, which will be found under a separate heading.

CROXBY is a very small village and parish, situated on the Wolds, in the Northern division of the county, parts of Lindsey, south division of Walshcroft wapentake, union and county court district of Caistor, rural deanery of Walshcroft, archdeaconry of Stow, and diocese of Lincoln, 5½ miles south-east from Caistor, 8 west from North Thoresby station, on the East Lincolnshire railway, and 9 north-east from Market Rasen station, on the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, and 10 south-west from Great Grimsby. The church of All Saints is a small building of Grimsby. The church of All Saints is a small building of stone, dating from about 1140, consisting of chancel, nave, and turret containing I bell: the font is very ancient, and bears Norman ornaments in good preservation.
