CROWLE is a parish and township and small market town, pleasantly situated in the Isle of Axholme and partly in the West Riding of Yorkshire, near the Staniforth and Keadby canal, 6 miles north from Epworth, 12 south from Goole, 16 north-east from Doncaster, 17 north from Gainsborough and 165 from London, with a station on the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, in the West Lindsey division of the county, west division of the wapentake of Manley, petty sessional division of Epworth, union and county court district of Thorne, parts of Lindsey, rural deanery of Axholme, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln. The town is governed by a Local Board of 9 members, formed Aug. 11, 1865, under the Local Government Act of 1858. The town is lighted with gas and paved. The church of St. Oswald is a building of stone, the older portions being Early English, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, north aisle, south porch, and an embattled western tower with pinnacles, containing 3 bells and a clock: historic evidences prove the early existence here of a church dedicated to St. Oswald, the Christian King of Northumbria, slain 5th August, 642, although probably only a wooden structure: the shaft of a Runic cross of stone, carved with interlaced ornament, and some figures, including a man on horseback, was used by the Norman masons as a lintel for the west-door, where it still remains: in 1868 the Rev. J. T. Fowler M.A., F.S.A. of Durham, discovered upon this stone the remains of an inscription: the south wall, of ashlar in small cubes, remains, with the inner jamb of one of the narrow Norman windows: the south doorway is of three orders, much enriched, and some stones of another door with zigzag moulding were found in the walling on the north side; the chancel, rebuilt about 1850, is said to be upon the old foundation, and inclines towards the north; the porch of brick and stone was added in 1628, and there is a carved oak almsbox dated 1683: the tenor bell is tolled according to a long-established custom on week days, at 6 a.m. at noon and at 6 p.m.: the church was restored in 1884 under the direction of Mr. A. S. Ellis, architect, of Westminster: there are 400 sittings. The register, including Eastoft, dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value, from 507 acres of glebe, £800, with residence, in the gift of and held since 1868 by the Rev. Frederick William White B.A. of Pembroke College, Cambridge, who is non-resident; the Rev. Charles Frederick Brotherton M.A. of Hatfield Hall, Durham, is curate in charge. The Catholic church, dedicated to the Blessed Sacrament and St. Norbert, was erected in 1872, and is an

edifice of brick in the Early English style, from the designs of Mr. A. M. Hadfield, architect, of Sheffield, and is attached to a monastery of Præmonstratensians, or White Canons, following the rule of their founder, St. Norbert, Archbishop of Magdeburgh 1120: there is also a school, and the buildings generally occupy a site of about two acres; the Very Rev. Martin Geudens C.R.P. is superior. Here are Congregational, Wesleyan, Baptist and Primitive Methodist chapels. The Cemetery, opened in 1863, covers about two acres of ground, and has two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. The Market Hall was erected in 1870 by a limited company, with a capital of £1,450, in £5 shares. There is also an Assembly Room. The market for stock is held every Monday fortnight during the months of March, April and May: there are also three annual fairs for cattle, held on the last Monday in May, and on the 23rd of November; and a statute for the hiring of farm labourers and domestic servants is held on the 11th of November. A weekly market is held every Friday. The principal landowners are Earl Manvers, who is lord of the manor, the trustees of the late Thomas Harsley Carnochan esq. Samuel Cornelius Brunyee esq. of Sand Hall, Thomas Cornelius Scholey esq. of Eastoft Grange, and the Vicar. The soil is warp and silt; subsoil, peat and sand. The chief crops are wheat, oats, flax, beans and potatoes. The area is 7,350 acres, inclusive of Eastoft; rateable value, £12,952; the population of the township in 1881 was 2,826, of which 28 were in Yorkshire; the population of the parish and Local Board district in 1881 was 3,353, which includes Eastoft, a township, which will be found under a separate heading.

EALAND is a hamlet 1 mile south-east.

CROXBY is a very small village and parish, situated on the wolds, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-east from Caistor, 8 west from North Thoresby station on the East Lincolnshire branch of the Great Northern railway, and 9 north-east from Market Rasen station on the Lincoln, Cleethorpes and Hull branch of the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, and 10 south-west from Great Grimsby, in the East Lindsey division of the county, parts of Lindsey, south division of Walshcroft wapentake, petty sessional division of Market Rasen, union and county court district of Caistor, rural deanery of Walshcroft, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln. The church of All Saints, originally erected about 1140, is a small building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave and a western turret containing one bell: the font is of Norman date: there are 80 sittings. The register dates

CROXTON is a small parish, 7 miles north-east from Brigg, $1\frac{1}{2}$ south-west from Brocklesby station on the main line of the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, and 165 from London, in the North Lindsey division of the county, parts of Lindsey, east division of Yarborough wapentake, Glanford Brigg union, Brigg petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Yarborough No. 1, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln. The church of St. John the Evangelist is a building of stone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel and nave, and an embattled western tower, with 8 pinnacles, containing a clock and one bell: the church was restored

only from the year 1812. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £262, gross yearly value £310, including 12 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Arthur Mountjoy Platt LL.M. of Jesus College, Cambridge. The Earl of Yarborough D.L., J.P. is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is light and chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area of the parish is 1,628 acres; rateable value, £1,483; the population in 1881 was 127.

The living is a rectory, gross yearly value from tithe rent-charge £460, net £390, including 6 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1837 by the Rev. Richard Kyrke M.A. of Queen's College, Oxford. Here is a lofty hill, called, from a large entrenchment on its summit, "Yarborough Camp." Roman coins have been found on the spot. The Earl of Yarborough D.L., J.P. is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is wold land; subsoil, chalk.
