CROWLE is a small market town and civil parish, pleasantly situated in the Isle of Axholme and partly in the West Riding of Yorkshire, near the Stainforth and Keadby canal, with a station on a branch from Doncaster to Grimsby of the Great Central railway, and another (Crowle Town station) on the Axholme Joint Railway. The town is 6½ miles north from Epworth, 13 south from Goole, 17 north-east from Doncaster, 17 north from Gainsborough and 165 (171¼ by rail) from London, in the Brigg division of the county, west division of the wapentake of Manley, petty sessional division of Epworth, union and county court district of Thorne, parts of Lindsey, rural deanery of Axholme, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln.

The town was governed by a Local Board from Aug. 11, 1865, until, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73), an Urban District Council was established; the town is lighted with gas and paved. The church of St. Oswald is a building of stone, the older portions being Norman, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, north aisle, south porch and an embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing 3 bells and a clock: historic evidences prove the early existence here of a church dedicated to St. Oswald, the Christian King of Northumbria, slain 5th August, 642, although probably only a wooden structure: the shaft of a Runic cross of stone, carved with interlaced ornament, and

some figures, including a man on horseback, was used by the Norman masons as a lintel and is over the tower arch: in 1868 the remains of an inscription were discovered: the south wall, of ashlar in small cubes, remains, with the inner jamb of one of the narrow Norman windows: the south doorway is of three orders, much enriched, and some stones of another door with zigzag moulding were found in the walling on the north side: the chancel, rebuilt about 1850, is said to be upon the old foundation, and inclines towards the north; the old porch of 1628 has been replaced by a fine new porch of stone: there is a carved oak almsbox dated 1683, and the communion plate includes a chalice dated 1663: the church was restored in 1884: there are 400 sittings. The register, including Eastoft, dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £700, arising from 427 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Lincoln, and held since 1915 by the Rev. Robert Pichman Norwood, of Oxford University. The Roman Catholic church, dedicated to the Blessed Sacrament and St. Norbert, was erected in 1872, and is an edifice of brick in the Early English style; attached to a monastery of Præmonstratensians, or White Canons, following the rule of their founder, St. Norbert, Archbishop of Magdeburgh, 1120: there is also a school, and the buildings generally occupy a site of about two acres; the Very Rev. Matthew W. Smith C.R.P. is prior. Here

is a Congregational chapel, founded in 1760, with 150 sittings; a Baptist chapel, founded in 1799, seating 150 persons; and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. The Cemetery, opened in 1863, covers about two acres of ground, and has two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a Burial Board of nine members. The Market Hall was erected in 1870 by a limited company, with a capital of £1,450, in £5 shares. There is also an Assembly Room. The market for stock is held every Monday fortnight during the months of March, April and May; there are also two annual fairs for cattle, held on the last Monday in May, and on the 23rd of November; and a statute for the hiring of farm labourers and

domestic servants is held on the second Saturday in November. The principal landowners are Earl Manvers, who is lord of the manor, the trustees of the late Thomas Harsley Carnochan esq. the trustees of the late Samuel Cornelius Brunyee esq. James Hemingbrough esq. J.P. and the Vicar. The soil is warp and silt; subsoil, peat and sand. The chief crops are wheat, oats, beans and potatoes. The area of the civil parish and Urban District is 6,874 acres of land and 52 of water; rateable value, £14,918; population in 1917, 2,853.

EALAND is a hamlet 1 mile south-east.

CROXBY is a parish and very small village, on the wolds, 8 miles west from North Thoresby station on the East Lincolnshire section of the Great Northern railway, and about the same distance east from North Kelsey and Holton-le-Moor stations and 9 north-east from Market Rasen station, all on the Lincoln and Hull section of the Great Central railway, 5½ south-east from Caistor and 10 south-west from Grimsby, in the Louth division of the county, parts of Lindsey, south division of Walshcroft wapentake, petty sessional division of Market Rasen, union and county court district of Caistor, East Walshcroft rural deanery, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln. The church of All Saints, originally erected about 1140, is a small building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave and a western turret containing one bell: the font is of Norman date: there are 80 sittings.

CROXTON is a small parish, 3 miles south-west from Brocklesby station on the main line of the Great Central railway, 7 north-east from Brigg and 16½ from London, in the Brigg division of the county, parts of Lindsey, east division of Yarborough wapentake, Glanford Brigg union, Brigg petty sessional division, Brigg and Scunthorpe county court district, rural deanery of North Yarborough, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln. The church of St. John the Evangelist is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, north aisle and an embattled western tower, with 8 pinnacles, containing one bell: the church was restored about 1878, at a cost of £1,300, when the doorway on the south side was built up and a porch erected on the north side: there are 90 sittings. The register dates from the year 1562. The living is a rectory, united to the vicarage of Kirmington, joint net

The register dates only from the year 1812, the previous registers having been burnt. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £260, including 12 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1915 by the Rev. Henry Frederick Goffe, who is also rector of and resides at Thoresway. The Earl of Yarborough P.C. is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is light and chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area of the parish is 1,624 acres of land and 16 of water; rateable value, £1,093; the population in 1911 was 110 in the civil parish and 300 in the ecclesiastical parish (which includes Thoresby). Letters through Caistor. Binbrook is the nearest money order & telegraph office, about 4 miles distant. The children of this place attend the school at Thorganby

yearly value £400, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1915 by the Rev. Percy Mallett M.A. of Worcester College, Oxford, who resides at Kirmington. Here is an elevation, called, from a large entrenchment on its summit, "Yarborough Camp." Roman coins have been found on the spot. The Earl of Yarborough is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is wold land; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats, but there is a considerable quantity of woodland. The area is 1517 acres; rateable value, £3,654; population in 1911, 119.

CUMBERWORTH is a parish and small scattered village, 3½ miles from the coast, 1¼ from Mumby Road station on the Willoughby and Louth branch and 3 north-east from the Willoughby junction station of the East Lincolnshire section of the Great Northern railway, 5 south-east from Alford and 10 north-east from Spilsby, in the Horncastle division of the county, parts of Lindsey, Marsh division of Calceworth hundred, Alford petty sessional division, Spilsby union and county court district, rural deanery of South Calcewaith, and archdeaconry and diocese of Lincoln. The church of St. Helen is a structure of brick and stone in the Decorated style, consisting of chancel and nave, with a wooden turret and spire, containing 3 bells: in 1870 the church was seated with open benches and partially restored, and the chancel repaved, at a cost of £400, and in 1899 a new vestry was added, at the cost of the rector: there are 120 sittings. The register dates from the year 1562. The living is a discharged rectory, united in 1733 to that of Anderby, joint net yearly value £432, with residence, in the gift of Magdalene College, Cambridge, and held since 1912 by the Rev. Joseph Baker, who resides at Anderby.

There are Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. The poor have 30s. a year, and an allotment of 5 acres of land subject to a charge of 40s. yearly. The principal landowners are Mr. George Plumtree, Mr. George Plumtree, jun. John Hagg and the trustees of the late Mr. Charles Fieldsend. The late Joseph Waite Hart esq. left £150, which has been invested in Government securities, and the interest is distributed amongst the poor by the rector and overseer at their discretion. The soil is mostly clay; subsoil, blue clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area of the parish is 1,274 acres; assessable value, £774; population in 1911, 172.
