CROWLE

IS a parish in the western division of the wapentake of Manley, parts of Lindsey; the village (formerly a market town) is 167 miles N. from London, 36 N. N. w. from Lincoln, 6 N. N. w. from Epworth, and 16 E. from Doncaster—situate at the north-western extremity of the Isle of Axholme, near the river Don, and within one mile of the Stainforth and Keadby canal, which passes it on the north. The land around here has been greatly in proceed by the greatest of the greatest of the passes. improved by the system of warping; that is, by admitimproved by the system of warping; that is, by admitting the water from the Trent, which, on its retiring, leaves a deposit of rich sediment. In the peat moor, near the town, at the depth of six feet beneath the surface, the body of a woman was discovered, in an erect position, in the year 1747: the sandals on the feet implied that it had been there for centuries; the hair and hails were entire, and the skin, though discoloured, was soft, and apparently sound. A petty session for the division is held at this place by the county magistrates,

and constables are appointed at the court leet of the

lord of the lord of the manor, the Earl Manners.

The church, dedicated to St. Oswald, is a very ancient structure, of which the original Saxon character is cou-cealed by repeated alterations and repairs, or obliterated by the hand of time; the chief relic is a fine circular arch, forming the principal entrance: the benefice is a vicarage, in the patronage and incumbency of the Rev. Godfrey Egremont, whose present curate is the Rev. James Johnson. There are places of worship for bap-tists, independents, and primitive and Wesleyan metho-dists. A charity school, for teaching children reading, writing and arithmetic, is partly supported by subscrip-tion, and by an endowment of £60. per annum, arising from various bequests. DONINGTON,

WITH THE VILLAGES OF GOSBERTON, QUADRING AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

ONINGTON is a small market town in the parish | The parish (which has no dependent township,) conof its name, wapentake of Kerton and parts of Holland; 110 miles N. from London, 30 s. E. by s. from Lincoln, 10 N. from Spalding, and 4 s. from Swineshead; situate in the fens, through which a firm rampart of earth has been constructed, forming a convenient road to Horb-ling, Sempringham, &c. Within two miles north-west of the town flows a drain, or canal, called the 'Forty-foot,' on which goods are conveyed in barges to Boston. Donington is a polling station at the election of members Donington is a polling station at the election of members to represent the parts of Kesteven and Holland. The church, dedicated to St. Mary and the Holy Rood, is of considerable antiquity; on the lower part of its steeple is a stone bearing a Roman inscription, which time has nearly obliterated: the benefice is a vicarage, of which the Rev. John Wilson is patron. Baptists and Wesleyan methodists have places of worship. There is a good free school, endowed by Mr. Cowley; and the poor of the the town receive relief from some other charities. The market is held on Saturday; and the fairs on the 25th market is held on Saturday; and the fairs on the 25th May and 17th October, for horses, cattle, flax and hemp. tained, in 1831, a population of 858 persons.

Gosberon is a straggling village in the parish of its

name, and same wapentake and division as Donington, about 4 miles s. from that town. At Rightbolt, a hamlet in this parish, was a cell belonging to an abbey at Sempringham. The church, dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul, is a neat edifice; the living, a discharged vicarage, is in the gift of the dean and chapter of Lincoln. In 1831 the parish (including the hamlets of CHEAL, RIGHTBOLT WESTHORPE,) contained 1,951 inhabitants.

QUADRING is a small village and a parish, also in the same wapentake and division as Donington, about three miles s. therefrom. The church is dedicated to Saint miles s. therefrom. The church is dedicated to Saint Margaret; the benefice, a discharged vicarage, united to that of Wigtoft, is in the patronage of the bishop of Lincoln. There are several endowments for the education of children; the principal of these arises from a rent-charge, bequeathed by Thomas Cowling in 1701.
