CROWLE is a thriving market town and railway station, distant 6 miles north from Epworth, 12 miles north from Goole, 16 miles north-east from Doncaster, 17 miles north-by-west from Gainsborough, and 165 miles north from London, in the northern division of the county of Lincoln, wapentake of Manley, union of Thorne, parts of Lindsey, pleasantly situated in the Isle of Axholme, diocese of Lincoln, archdeaconry of Stow, deanery of Axholme, near the south Yorkshire railway and the Staniforth and Keadby canal. This parish includes the hamlet of EALAND, with 167 inhabitants. The market is held every Monday fortnight during the months of March, April, and May; there are also three annual fairs for cattle, &c., held on the last Monday in May, 14th of September, and on the 23rd of

November; and a statute for the hiring of farm labourers and domestic servants is held on the 11th of November. The town is lighted with gas, and is paved, and there is an Assembly-room. The living is a vicarage, value £777, in the patronage and incumbency of the Rev. William Duncombe, M.A. The church of St. Oswald, a handsome edifice in the Saxon style, is in good repair, and has a tower and 3 bells. The Independents, Wesleyans, Baptists, and Primitive Methodists have each a chapel here; there is also a Free school. The population in 1851 was 2,548, besides Eastoft, exclusive of the other township, with about 6,000 acres of land; the town contains a population of 2,245. Earl Manvers is lord of the manor
