CROWLE is a small market town and railway station, pleasantly situated in the Isle of Axholme, in the Northern division of the county, west division of the wapentake of Manley, union and county court district of Thorne, parts of Lindsey, rural deanery of Axholme, archdeaconry of Stow, and diocese of Lincoln, near the South Yorkshire Railway and the Stanforth and Keadby Canal, distant 6 miles north-west from Epworth, 12 south from Goole, 16 north-east from Doncaster, 17 north-by-west from Gainsborough, and 165 north from London. The church of St. Oswald is a large stone edifice, in various styles of architecture, and consists of nave, aisle, chancel, and tower with 3 bells. The living is a vicarage, annual value £1,100, in the gift of, and held by, the Rev. H. P. W. Hughes. Here is an endowed school, with extensive common rights, and 15 acres of land, bequeathed for the education of the poor by Richard Brewer, 1687, Thomas Walkwood, 1692, and Richard Clark, 1721; also places of worship for Independents, Wesleyans, Baptists, and Primitive Methodists. The town is lighted with gas, and is paved, and there is an Assembly-room. The Local Board of Health Act was adopted here in 1865. The market is held every Monday fortnight during the months of March, April, and May; there are also three annual fairs for cattle, &c., held on the last Monday in May, and on the 23rd of November; and a statute for the hiring of farm labourers and domestic servants is held on the 11th of November. The principal landowners are Earl Manvers (who is lord of the manor), Thomas Harsley Carnochan, Esq., John Brunyee, Esq., and the Rev. H. P. W. Hughes. The soil is warp and silt; subsoil, peat and sand. The chief crops are wheat, oats, line, beans, and fluke potatoes. The area is 7,350 acres, inclusive of Eastoft, and the population in 1861 was 2,648.

EALAND is a hamlet.

CROXBY is a very small village and parish, situated on the Wolds, in the Northern division of the county, parts of Lindsey, south division of Walshcroft wapentake, union and county court district of Caistor, diocese and archdeaconry of Lincoln, Walshcroft rural deanery, distant 5½ miles south-east from Caistor, 9 north-east from Market Rasen station, 14 north-west from Louth, and 10 south-west from Great Grimsby. The church of All Saints is a small stone fabric of considerable antiquity, consisting of nave, chancel, and turret containing 1 bell. The living is a

CROXTON is a small agricultural parish, with a considerable quantity of woodland, in the Northern division of the county, parts of Lindsey, east division of Yarborough wapentake, Caistor union, Brigg county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Lincoln, rural deanery of Yarborough, distant 7 miles north-east from Brigg, 3 miles from the Ulceby station, and 165 from London. The church of St. John is a neat structure, and has 1 bell. The living is a rectory, annual value £420, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held by the Rev. James Tate, M.A., of Corpus

CUMBERWORTH is a small scattered village and parish, in the Mid division of the county, parts of Lindsey, Marsh division of Calceworth hundred, Spilsby union and county court district, Calceworth rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Lincoln, distant about 4 miles south-east from Alford station, 10 north-east from Spilsby, and 4 from the coast. The church of St. Helen is a good substantial edifice, consisting of nave and chancel, with a graceful wooden spire, which contains 3 bells. The living is a discharged rectory, united in 1733 to that of Anderby, joint annual value about £650, in the gift of Magdalen College, Cambridge, and held by the Rev. John Bond, M.A., of

rectory, annual value £300, with 13 acres of glebe land, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held by the Rev. John Alington, M.A., of Magdalen College, Oxford. The Earl of Yarborough is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is light and chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area of the parish is 1,628 acres, and the population in 1861 was 147.
