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MANLEY WAPENTAKE (WESTERN DIVISION.)

The ISLE of AXHOLME, as noticed at page 594, comprises all the Western Division of Manley Wapentake, and is divided into the following parishes and townships, including the small market towns of Crowle and Epworth, and containing about 13,000 souls and 50,000 acres of land, forming a low champaign district, extending 17 miles along the west side of the Trent, and lying within the jurisdiction of the Court of Sewers, established under a charter of Charles I., for the drainage and improvement of the great "Level of Hatfield Chase, and parts adjacent," which comprise about 180,000 acres of land, in Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, and Nottinghamshire, formerly consisting of lakes, morasses, and fens, with a few intervening parks, patches of wood, and small plots of cultivated ground, nearly all subject to inundation during spring tides, and the land floods of the Trent, Ouse, and Don, the latter of which expanded its waters in the levels through several channels, until it was confined, in the reign of Charles I., to a new cut, called the Dutch River, by which it now runs direct from Thorne to The drainage of this Royal Chase was entrusted to the Ouse, near Goole. Cornelius Vermuden, and his Dutch and Flemish followers, who came over in great numbers to assist Vermuden, who, according to the articles signed May 24th, 1626, was to be rewarded with one-third of the recovered lands. Of the remaining two-thirds, one-half was to be given to the tenants of the manors, who were also to be freed from the forest laws, and the depredations of the King's deer. As this great improvement deprived the poor of their former right of fishing, fowling, and hunting, many riots took place during the progress of the work; the banks were sometimes broken down, the working implements destroyed, and the Dutch and Flemish settlers maltreated, and some of them killed; though Vermuden, in order to satisfy the malcontents, took many of them into his employ, at high wages. had so far completed the vast undertaking in 1629, that he was rewarded with the honour of knighthood, and took a lease from the Crown of the manorial rights, and of all the interest the King had in the recovered lands and the ancient demesne; but the riots and the opposition of the "commoners against the participants" did not finally subside till 1719. Since that period, the Isle of Axholme has been greatly improved both by draining and warping, and the drainage of the low lands in the parishes of Owston, Epworth, and Belton, (which are in many places eight feet below the usual high water mark of spring tides in the Trent,) is materially assisted by steam engines, which pump the water into the higher levels, so as to run off into the river, from the Butterwick South Drain, the Ings Drain, and the Black Dyke Drain. A drainage act has lately been obtained for warping up some of the lowest lands by means of the deposits from the feculent tides of the Trent. The manors are mostly held by lessees of the Crown, and the soil belongs to numerous freeholders and copyholders, and is highly productive in corn, line, potatoes, mustard, rye grass seeds, &c., for which the Trent, and the Stainforth and Keadby Canal, afford a cheap and ready transit to distant markets. Deeply imbedded in the peaty soil, trunks and roots of large trees are often found. The central parts of the Isle have a gentle ascent, and abound in gypsum, valuable both for plaster work and manure.

ALTHORPE, a village on the west bank of the Trent, opposite Burringham, 5 miles E.S.E. of Crowle, has in its township 335 souls, and 1133A. 3R. 27P. of land, including the adjacent hamlet of Derrythorpe. Geo. Skipworth, Esq., is lord of the manor of Althorpe, and owner of a great part of the soil; and T. Lightfoot, Esq., is lord of the manor of Derrythorpe; but R. S. Johnson, Esq., and several smaller owners, have estates here. The parish includes, also, Amcotts and Keadby townships. The Church (St Oswald) has a tower and three bells, and was built in the reign of Edward IV., by Sir John Neville. An additional churchyard was consecrated on June 7th, 1856. The benefice is a rectory, valued in K.B. at £25, but now worth £400 per annum, in the patronage of the Crown, and incumbency of the Rev Jas. Aspinall, M.A., who has about 24A. of glebe, and a good Rectory House, built in 1841. a Wesleyan Chapel, built in 1834; and at Derrythorpe is a Primitive Methodist Chapel. John Langley, a native of Althorpe, was lord mayor of London in 1576. The parish school is supported by subscription and the children's pence.

AMCOTTS, a village and township, in Althorpe parish, on the Trent, 4½ miles E. by N. of Crowle, and 3 miles S. by W. of Burton Stather, contains 410 souls, and 1991 acres of land. Rt. Amcotts, Esq., (lord of the manor,) and J. B. Faviell, Esq., own nearly all the soil except one farm of 122A. allotted in lieu of tithes, at the enclosure. The ancient Chapel (St Thomas a Becket) was rebuilt in 1850, at the cost of £1300, of which £500 was given by Jeremiah Faviell, Esq., and the rest by smaller subscribers. After the death of the present rector of Althorpe, Amcotts will be

a separate perpetual curacy, endowed with the land here, which was awarded to the rector at the enclosure. Here is a Wesleyan Chapel. The poor have £1. 18s. a year, left by Wm. Barker, H. Hodgson, and N. Belton.

KEADBY is a village and township in Althorpe parish, 4 miles E. of Crowle, on the west bank of the Trent, at the point where the Stainforth and Keadby Canal falls into that river. It has 602 inhabitants, and 1407 acres of land. The 602 inhabitants in 1851 included 188 in ships and boats. Mrs Dunn, of Howden, is lady of the manor, but part of the soil belongs to the Rev S. Hall, C. J. Phillips, Esq., and several smaller owners. A Church is about to be built at Keadby by Mrs Dunn. The Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have each a chapel here. Wm. Dixon, about a century ago, left for the poor, a house in the village, and two acres of land in the North field. This land was exchanged, at the enclosure for $17\frac{1}{2}$ acres, now worth £2 per acre per annum, having been enriched by the warping process.

BELTON, a large village 2 miles N. of Epworth, has in its parish 1738 souls, and 8520A. 2R. 11P. of land, including the hamlets of Carhouses, Mosswood, Woodhouse, and Westgate, 1 mile W. and N.W.; Beltoft, 1½ mile E.; and Sandtoft, 3 miles W.N.W. of the village; also, Temple Belwood, the elegant mansion of Robt. Steer Johnson, Esq., embosomed in an extensive grove, 3 miles N. of Epworth; and Hirst Priory, the handsome seat of Geo. Spofforth Lister, Esq., pleasantly situated near the New Torne river or drain, 2 miles S. of Crowle. A fair is held at Belton, on September 25th, chiefly for the sale of line, or flax, which is extensively grown in the neigh-The manor belongs to the Crown, but the soil belongs to many freeholders and copyholders, the largest of whom are R. S. Johnson, Esq., (owner of about one-third of the parish; the Corporation of Lincoln, owners of the rectorial land and tithes, (worth £1200 per annum,) G. S. Lister, Esq., Earl Manvers, and the Dent, Tomline, İngilby, Tyas, Bellwood, Skipworth, and other families. There lies near the surface, in this parish and neighbourhoad, a stratum of excellent gypsum, which is manufactured into plaster for floors, ceilings, &c., and into sulphate of lime for manure; to all of which purposes it is admirably adapted; indeed, as a fertiliser of the soil, it is highly beneficial. Ancient coins, spears, battleaxes, &c., have been found in the parish. Near the handsome mansion called Hirst Priory, was a cell of Augustine canons, annexed to Nostal Abbey, and valued at the dissolution at £5. 10s. 1d.; but all traces of it The Dutch and Flemish Protestants who assisted Vermuden in the drainage of the levels, in the reign of Charles I., erected a chapel, with a house for the minister, at Sandtoft, but it went to decay after the death of its fifth incumbent. Sandtoft Grove, a neat farm-house, embowered in trees, is the property of G. A. Bellwood, Esq. Sandtoft was given, by one of the Mowbrays, to St Mary's Abbey, York, and had for some time a small Benedictine cell. Beltoft was anciently the seat of the Sheffield family. Belton Church (All Saints) is a large and handsome fabric, of the age of Henry VI., and has in its chancel three stone stalls, a piscina, and a tomb. bearing the recumbent effigy of a knight in armour. In 1851, the east end of the chancel was rebuilt, and one of its windows is enriched with stained glass, in memory of the late Mrs Hilton, sister of R S. Johnson, Esq. The Rectory, valued in K.B. at £32. 2s. $2\frac{1}{2}$ d., is in the impropriation of the Corporation of Lincoln; but the benefice is a perpetual curacy, now valued at £200, in the patronage of Jno. Hood, Esq., and incumbency of the Rev Thos. Skipworth, who has held it since 1814. The Rev W. R. Allcroft is the officiating curate, and occupies the Rectory House, a neat mansion, with tasteful pleasure grounds. Belton Grange, a farm of 522A., was allotted in lieu of part of the tithes, at the enclosure, and is now let for £550, but the deductions for drainage, land and property taxes, &c., reduce the net yearly rent paid to Lincoln Corporation to £400. The remaining tithes are commuted for a yearly corn rent of £836. 18s. 8d. Sir John Ferne author of "The Blazon of Gentrie," was born at Temple Belwood, the seat of his family, and died about 1610, leaving several sons, one of whom became Bishop of Chester. The poor parishioners have the following yearly doles, 2 p 3

viz., about £30, from 17A. 2R. 53P. of land, left by John Lightfoot, in 1708, except 11a. 1R. 34P. allotted at the enclosure; 20 yards of blue cloth. and 10s. in money, left by Robt. Bernard, and charged on an estate here, now belonging to Richd. Tyas, Esq., of Doncaster; 12 yards of blue cloth, left by Stephen Caister, and charged on land now belonging to Mr Thomas Theaker; and £4.15s., in five rent charges, derived from the bequests of Geo. Meggott, Jane Beard, and Fras. Glew. The gift of the latter was about three acres of land, now held by three persons, subject only to £1. 15s. per annum, in the shape of rent charges. There is a Lodge of Druids at the Bull's Head. A troublesome weed which grows prolifically in the drains and canals of Lincolnshire, and often impedes the navigation, is supposed to have originated from the use of guano.

CROWLE, a small but thriving market town, near the channel of the old river Don, 6 miles N. of Epworth, and 17 miles N. by W. of Gainsbro', increased its inhabitants from 1889, in 1831, to 2548 souls in 1851, and has in its township about 6000 acres of land, including the hamlet of Ealand, 1 mile S.E.; Crowle Wharf, on the Stainforth and Keadby Canal, 11 mile S. of the town; and about 500 acres of moor land, lying within the Yorkshire border, and assessed to the county rates of the West Riding, though there is no dwelling upon it. Of this moor, about 200 acres have been enclosed and much improved by warping during the last ten years. Crowle parish includes also Eastoft township, and many parts of it have been fertilized by the warping process. It is in Thorne Union and County Court District. Its market, formerly held every Saturday, is now only held every Monday fortnight, during the months of March, April, and May. Here are three annual fairs for cattle, flax, &c., held on the last Monday in May, on Sept. 14th, and on Nov. 23rd or old Martinmas-day. Crowle biennial cattle fair was held on Monday, June 26th, 1856. Gas Works were erected here in 1854. The old Don is now only a small brook, but the surrounding country is so intersected on every side by drains, canals, and embankments, as to give it the appearance of a Dutch settlement. The growth of potatoes, &c., and the cultivation and dressing of flax, find employment for many of the inhabitants. During the last ten years. the town has been much improved. An Assembly Room was built in 1848. Earl Manvers is lord of the manor of Crowle, but the greater part of the soil belongs to numerous copyholders and a few small freeholders. In 1747, the body of a woman was found at the depth of six feet, in the Peat Moor, near Crowle, (but in Amcotts township,) in an erect position; and though, from the antique sandals on her feet, she appeared to have been there several centuries, her hair and nails were as fresh as when living; and the skin was soft and strong, though of a tawny colour. The Church (St. Oswald) has undergone many repairs, but still retains a little of its original Saxon architecture. Its chancel underwent extensive

repairs and alterations in 1856. The living is a vicarage, valued in K.B. at £14. 10s., and now at £777, in the patronage and incumbency of the Rev. Wm. Duncombe, M.A. The Rectory is in the impropriation of R. S. Johnson, Esq.; but the tithes were commuted at the enclosure, in 1813, when about 500 acres were awarded to the vicar. There are in the town four chapels, belonging to the Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, the Independents, and the General Baptists. Three houses, with extensive commonrights, and ten acres of land, were bequeathed to this parish, for the education and relief of the poor, by Richard Brewer, in 1687; Thomas Walkwood, in 1692; and Richard Clark, in 1721. The land and commonrights were exchanged at the enclosure for 21A. 3R. 10P. of tithe-free land, and the sum of £206. The latter was expended in repairing the buildings, and the whole estate is now let for about £60 per annum. The trustees pay the schoolmaster £48 a year, for teaching 48 free scholars, besides an allowance for coals. Tetley Hall, in Crowle township, is the seat of Henry Lister Maw, Esq., and is approached by a fine avenue of trees. His ancestors were long seated here, and one of them suffered martyrdom at Lincoln. Sand Hall, about a mile S.W. of the town, is the seat of John Brunyee, Esq.

EASTOFT, a pleasant village and township, in Crowle parish, on the south side of the small channel of the Old Don, opposite a place of the same name in Yorkshire, 3½ miles N.E. of Crowle, contains 1273a. 1R. 2P. of land, and increased its inhabitants from 282 souls in 1841, to 460 in The other Eastoft township is in Adlingfleet parish, Yorkshire, and contains 1389 acres, and only 90 souls. The Yorkshire township belongs to Lady Strickland; but Earl Manvers is lord of the manor of the Lincolnshire township, which is held by a number of copyholders and a few The two townships have recently been constituted ecclesiasfreeholders. cally a separate district parish, in the diocese of York. In 1855, Lady Strickland erected on the Yorkshire side of the village a handsome Church (St. Bartholomew,) in the early English style, and she has endowed it with £150 per annum, and has also erected a National School and a neat Parsonage House. The church and church-yard were consecrated Nov. 1st, The foundress is patroness of the perpetual curacy, and the Rev. G. F. Wade is the first incumbent. The New Connexion and Primitive Methodists have small chapels in the Lincolnshire part of the village.
